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

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
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Welcome

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

H&G AUGUST DESIGN

Inga Sempé

This talented Parisian designer reveals the influences behind her work for Ligne Roset, now celebrating 150 years



WHAT WERE YOUR EARLY INFLUENCES?

I grew up in

Paris surrounded by buildings, buses, stairs, doors, shops and street furniture - things built by humans. My parents are both artists and are sensitive to their environment, so I guess I am the same. As a teenager, I would go to flea markets every week, just looking at all the different objects and absorbing them without knowing where they were made or by whom. That has been a big influence on me.

WHAT DOES DESIGN MEAN TO YOU?

It is a complex mix of function, looks, the market, materials, drawing, engineering, technology, ergonomics, and production. Every one of these is important and helps to explain why beautiful long-lasting products made in Europe can often be costly for consumers.

TELL US ABOUT LIGNE ROSET

I have been working with the company for four years and now have five ranges in production. I adore its attitude: director Michel Roset shares my ideas and my culture. The company's prototype workshop is very advanced. My first sofa. Moël, was in solid foam, so I wanted my latest design, Ruché (below), to be full of air with high legs - a kind of light chesterfield.

HOW IMPORTANT IS SEWING TO YOU?

My mother hated it so I learnt on my own as a teenager. For the Ruché sofa, I did about 50 experiments on a machine I have owned since I was 14. We then had to transfer the idea to an industrial sewing machine – a huge computer-driven frame, four metres square.

ARE YOUR DESIGNS FEMININE?

That is a cliché that makes me mad. Who talks about male design? Men quilt, pleat and sew - do origami - and no one says that is feminine. I studied industrial design, which included metal work, and some of my "pleated" pieces are die-cast. I would love to design a hammer, but will anyone ask me?

WHAT ELSE HAVE YOU BEEN WORKING ON?

A group of five small lamps in a tough pleated paper-like plastic called Tyvek, for Moustache, (moustache.fr). I also designed an electric clock for them with a quirky pendulum.



WHAT INSPIRED HOLLY'S HOUSES?

I've been fascinated by different styles of

houses and buildings ever since I was a child. I'm a big heritage lover and was lucky enough to grow up in a beautiful Victorian house, which has been a constant source of inspiration for me. It was the subject of my first stamp. Suddenly a light went on; I knew I'd hit on a good idea and things went from there.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

It's really simple. All I need is a photograph of a house or building - the larger the better, so I can see all the details. Customers can send me their photos in the post or by email to holly@hollyshouses.co.uk. I'll do a black and white drawing and send this illustration to a manufacturer who makes the stamps. There is also the option to add an address or

date under the illustration at no additional cost.

HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE?

Once I receive the photo and payment (from £69 for the stamp and ink pad), I can usually have the stamp finished and sent out to customers in around ten days. However, I can prioritise work if it's for a special occasion. I have done quick jobs for birthdays, Mother's Day and anniversaries before.

CAN YOU ILLUSTRATE ANY KIND OF PROPERTY?

One of the things I love most about my job is the sheer variety of buildings I get to see and illustrate. They range from farmhouses and quaint English country pubs to cutting-edge architecture in stunning coastal locations. I also create stamps for weddings that include an illustration of the church, the names of the bride and groom, date and venue. My stamps can


personalise anything from letters and invitations to menus.

ANY UNUSUAL REQUESTS?

People have asked me to create pictures of their dream home from a mix of properties they love. They're essentially asking for a fictional hybrid house. I've also added extensions on to illustrations that people haven't got round to building yet. It's great because it means I'm catering for people's dreams as well as their realities.

WHAT ARE YOUR FAVOURITE PROJECTS?

I made a stamp for a well-known magazine editor and it was very interesting to see where she lived. I'm quite nosy, so I enjoy that part. I also made a stamp for a lovely couple in New York who were getting married in an amazing old Dutch barn. It made a fantastic stamp and they were really pleased with it. It's great to get feedback.



ROS WINDSOR'S FAVOURITE CHEESE SHOP

"There are lots of wonderful cheese shops in France, which have been a real inspiration for me here at Paxton & Whitfield, but my favourite is Androuet, both for the breadth of its range and also for its spirit of openness, which makes shopping there such a joy. The staff are very happy to talk you through what is on offer and let you taste the cheese. I love their approach so much that Paxton & Whitfield collaborates with them and some of their range is available through our stores. The business was established in 1909 by Henri Androuët whose aim was to offer Parisians cheeses from all over France. The company has half a dozen branches in Paris, but my favourite is on Rue Mouffetard. With its rich and varied choice of food shops, restaurants and regular open-air markets, this street is an essential destination for anyone interested in French cuisine. British visitors, however, should remember that, like many food shops in France. Androuet is closed for much of the afternoon, but opens later into the evening."

"The fairs in L'Isle-sur-la-Sorgue in Provence – at Easter and in August – are great sources of antiques. Fascinating at any time, the town is not just about antiques; there are all sorts of other interests, too."




TRICIA GUILD'S FAVOURITE HOTEL

"La Colombe d'Or is quite simply my all-time favourite hotel in France. Nestled in the hillside of Saint-Paul de Vence in Provence, it is a haven of tranquillity and style. Filled with works of art by Picasso, Matisse and Chagall - all of whom exchanged their work for board and lodgings when they were struggling artists - the hotel shares these treasures with its guests in a way that no gallery ever can: with a generosity of spirit and a good measure of Gallic élan. I particularly love the fact that the hotel is so different in summer and winter; summer sees the courtyard come alive with guests and diners. Beautiful tables are laid with polished cutlery and flickering candles; smart waiters effortlessly balance trays of the freshest salads and delicious goat's cheeses or piles of wild strawberries and melon. Relaxing by the fabulous swimming pool with its stunning Alexander Calder mobile or enjoying an aperitif on the balcony is a treasured summer treat for me and my family. In winter, with log fires lit, the atmosphere at La Colombe is entirely different - indulgent and cosy. The art on the dining room walls is the most magnificent accompaniment to any meal and the wonderfully evocative bar is the perfect spot for a digestif after dinner."







BEN PENTREATH'S FAVOURITE BUILDING

"This is as hard to pinpoint as trying to suggest a favourite piece of music, art

or food. My favourite French building exists in my imagination, inspired by childhood holidays on the Brittany coast and, later, trips to Paris, Aix-en-Provence and the Dordogne. It is a building that is at its best in the heat: stone-built with cool limestone floors and grey shutters, a view of the sea and the sound of gulls in the air. It is formal without being smart and is decorated in shades of white, with linen and old furniture that has seen better days. It is on the edge of a village with stone pillars and rusting metal railings, and has a quiet garden with vegetables in the flower beds and roses climbing up to a dark slate roof."





"Au Petit Bonheur la Chance in Paris is a tiny crammed treasure trove selling old and new post cards, coffee bowls, rubber stamps and old ink pots. It is absolutely not designed, but is evocative of how shops used to be.

HOUSE CLINIC

Our expert Celia Rufey answers your questions

WHICH FINISH IS BEST FOR A WOODEN KITCHEN FLOOR?

We are laying a solid oak floor in our kitchen and would like to know which finish would be the most practical and hard wearing. GP, CHRISTCHURCH, DORSET.

Lacquered and oiled finishes both have pros and cons. Lacquered finishes are more resilient, but when they need to be renewed, the whole floor has to be stripped. Peter Keane at The Natural Wood Floor Company, 020 8871 9771, naturalwoodfloor.co.uk, suggests a pre-oiled finish, which comes in a range of colours. Oiled finishes can mark easily, but their look is more accommodating. With an oiled finish, worn areas can be re-finished locally without treating the whole floor. This is an advantage in a kitchen where the area in front of the sink or cooker receives particularly heavy wear.



WHERE CAN I FIND A LONG CURTAIN POLE?

I need a 4m curtain pole for the windows and French doors that extend across one wall of our living room. The curtains are heavy so the pole needs to be sturdy, but hopefully also reasonably priced. KS, FARNHAM, SURREY.

A 4m pole will be supplied in two sections as it exceeds normal carriage restrictions, but will come with a joining piece, which is covered by a bracket and concealed once fitted. The Opera Bulb 29mm diameter pole from Copes, 0845 619 0135, copes.co.uk, comes in Antique Brass and Black Chrome finishes (above) and a set spanning 4m, including brackets, rings, ball finials and joining piece, costs from £60. Jim Lawrence, 01473 826680, jim-lawrence.co. uk, supplies 4m iron poles in two sections. Poles come in various finishes, including beeswax, and for a 25mm diameter pole with brackets, curtain rings, ball finials and joining rod, expect to pay from £190.



CAN YOU SUGGEST A DINING TABLE FOR A MODERN SPACE?

We are thinking of a white-washed oak table for our contemporary space, but are open to suggestions. LT, LONDON W14.

The Vision dining table by Berrydesign, 01635 255352, berrydesign.co.uk, comes in solid oak with tapered legs and a curving top that appears to float. It can be made to any size and you can specify the degree of whiteness of its finish.

Measuring L200xW100cm, it is priced at £3,107. The Bac table by Jasper Morrison for Capellini, 020 7014 5980, capellini.it, measures L240xW85cm and costs £3,100. You might also want to consider the Jack oak table (below) by Philipp Mainzer. It has a white finish, measures L210xW100cm and costs £2,221 from Viaduct, 020 7278 8456, viaduct.co.uk.

HOW CAN I HANG PICTURES ACCURATELY?

What is the best way to hang a set of pictures in a precise grid layout? EC, PAIGNTON, DEVON.

Jeff Pearman at JPW, 020 8789 3185, jpwfineart.co.uk, says that measuring is key to hanging pictures. Start by checking that the D-rings are exactly the same distance from the top of each frame. Next, lay the set on the floor face up and measure from top to bottom and left to right, including the spaces, for the group's overall height and width. If the pictures are to hang centrally on the wall, find and mark the centre point. Hang the top centre picture first by measuring from the top of the frame down to an imaginary line between its D-rings. Transfer this to the wall, check with a spirit level and hammer in two picture hooks. Once you have hung the first picture, use your spirit level to establish a top or base line with which to centre up and measure each additional picture.



HOW CAN WE RE-USE A CARPET IN A LARGER SPACE?

We will be in temporary accommodation while our house is being renovated, and I want to lay a carpet in the nursery there. How can we re-use it when we return to our own house where the floor space is 50cm bigger all round? RC, LONDON SE3.

You can add a 50cm border of carpet in a contrasting shade (right) or buy enough of the carpet to add the border when it is relaid but include a narrow strip in a contrasting shade between the two sections. Even if the main carpet varies slightly due to wear and tear, it won't be as noticeable when separated in this way.

ARE ANY BLINDS WASHABLE?
We need blinds for our garden room
but, living opposite a farm, textiles suffer from
fly deposits. I would like Roman blinds but fear
they will fade. Can you suggest styles that can

they will fade. Can you suggest styles that can be washed and also provide insulation? BK, NEWARK, NOTTINGHAMSHIRE.

If Roman blinds are your first choice, they could be made in a fade-resistant, washable synthetic fabric from the Al Fresco collection, £54.64m, by Osborne & Little, 020 7352 1456, osborneandlittle.com, or from Perennials Fabrics, from £75m, at Robert Spurway. 020 7351 6888, perennialsfabrics.com. These fabrics are not permitted for use on interior furniture unless given a fire-resistant treatment, but the restrictions do not apply to their use as blinds. For extra insulation, add a thermal lining. John Lewis, 0845 604 9049. johnlewis.com, sells this for £7.95m, but it is not washable, so you would have to wipe down the blinds. The alternative would be conservatory blinds such as Duette or Plissé (above) by Luxaflex, 0800 652 7799. luxaflex.com. Both have insulating properties and can be lifted down and washed in the bath.

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Most people find house hunting quite traumatic, but for Judith and Nick Woodward it has become a career. They both work in property – Judith runs a residential search company based in the Cotswolds, while Nick works on the commercial side – and their combined experience is such that they both recognise a good house when they see one. So when images

of a striking six-bedroom maison de maître in southwest France arrived by email in Judith's inbox, she wasted no time in arranging an early viewing.

"Nick immediately flew out to see the property," she recalls.
"It was summertime and all the roses were out and the combination, I think, caused a real coup de coeur. He is normally quite cautious, so when he said we had to buy it, I could not believe it. It seemed quite out of character for Nick as it was only the second house we had looked at."

It is easy, however, to understand Nick's enthusiasm. The honey-coloured maître de maison, or manor, sits snugly on the

side of a hill amid the rolling landscape of Gers, a department in Gascony famed for its foie gras, Armagnac and for being the birthplace of the real captain of King Louis XIV's Musketeers, Charles de Batz-Castelmore. Visitors arrive by a track that winds up the hill past a lake and into a pretty courtyard framed by a pigeonnier and stone outbuildings. Behind the 19th-century house, lawns and an orchard lead down to a walled garden planted with lavender and fig trees.

Idyllic it may be, but the house has not always looked like this. Twenty years ago it was owned by a farmer who bred black rabbits, both inside and outside the house. The property was almost derelict when it was rescued and renovated by a Parisian couple who used it as a holiday home. Great travellers, they chose to decorate the interior in a country style that owed more to the English tradition than the French.

"Not only did the house feel very English," says Judith, "but the previous owners had used the same colour scheme as our home in Oxfordshire, which was such a coincidence, so I could immediately picture all our furniture here." If Judith and Nick

had harboured any doubts about completely changing their lifestyle to make a permanent move across the Channel, a second visit quickly dispelled them. By November the house was theirs and they had moved in by February. "It was cold and wet and it rained for the next month," says Judith. When the sun eventually came out in March, she realised for the first time that there was a view of the Pyrenees from the kitchen window.

Although the house was comfortable, there was a certain amount of work to be done to turn it into a full-time home for the couple and all the livestock they had brought with them from England. They added guttering, converted the barn into stabling and fenced the paddock. They also re-fashioned the kitchen, adding an Aga, a butler's sink and new cabinetry.

The proportions of the house were so generous that most of the couple's furniture from their former home fitted perfectly, while the period portraits that Nick collects enhance the English feel. He has a particular fascination for the Duke of Wellington, whose portrait now hangs prominently in the living room. Proof indeed that there is a corner of a foreign field that is forever England.

TERRACE

The couple enjoy meals outside, here and on the lawn. Having moved their livestock to France, they also make full use of the outbuildings.

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
















uilding a new home that successfully incorporates the ruins of a much older one is not a project that anyone undertakes lightly but, for antiques dealer Nicolas Winter and his wife Corinne, it presented a challenge they could not resist.

The couple were happily living in a modern house in the ancient town of Uzès in the Gard, Languedoc, south-west France, and had no thought of moving. Then one day while out and about they came across a plot of land for sale and were so struck by its position and potential that they decided to put their house on the market and make plans to build a new one.

The site was in a perfect location – near the town centre and within range of, but not on top of, neighbouring properties. The Winters, who are devotees of contemporary architecture, had visions of building a house that was modern without being too harsh, and sympathetic to the surrounding buildings but distinctively different at the same time.

The question they faced was how to make their vision work with the ruins of a 17th-century bishop's palace that happened to stand on the site. Fortunately for the Winters, the ruins were deemed of no historic interest and were also relatively straightforward in construction. What remained standing were just three partial walls of the original building, along with the foundations of some outbuildings and a few old lime trees nearby. It seemed a waste not to use the stone from the palace within the new building so, instead of filling in the foundations, Nicolas and Corinne were inspired by the layout and decided to incorporate it into their design.

They produced some rough sketches and to help them turn their ideas into a real home, the couple approached fellow countryman and friend, architect Stéphan Ziack. They had seen one of Stéphan's projects elsewhere in the Gard and felt sure he was the perfect person to help.

Three years on, the Winters live in a house that is new and distinct from its neighbours but also wears its past with ease and style. Constructed as a combination of flat-topped and shallow-roofed boxes laid in a row with verandas interspersed between, the house has exterior walls softened by Stéphan's use of stone from the ruins while, inside, the Winters have added

touches of grandeur - beamed ceilings and panelling, as well as a great stone fireplace - all of which the old bishop might have approved.

The interior decoration is equally mixed but beautifully judged. "We decided against clutter and wanted to use a monochrome palette – plenty of black, white, chrome and mirrors," says Nicolas. The search for the right pieces to fill the house was easy, as Nicolas could combine it with buying trips for Antiquité du Duché, his shop in Uzès. The 1960s chair in the living room, for instance, was meant for the shop but ended up staying in the house: "I don't know who made it but it is marvellous." Recovered in black leather, it sits in stark glory on an antique zebra skin daring anyone who sits on the extra-long white sofa to come and try it out for size.

While the living room is outward looking, open and airy, with views of the lawn, pool and wooded landscape beyond, the library is more intimate and enclosed. Its windows are infinitely smaller and louvred to keep the room dimly lit and cosy, while the walls are panelled and painted. You can see that Nicolas has had fun decorating this room; the panelled effect was created by using cupboards salvaged from a 19th-century chemist's shop in Anneyron and, instead of hanging a still life or family portrait above the fire, he has hung a side of beef or, rather, a 19th-century painting of one.

The Winters' irreverent take on interior design is echoed in their treatment of the newly landscaped garden. A large white flowerpot that is, in fact, a light stands at one end of the swimming pool, providing a strikingly modern note which contrasts nicely with the Romaninspired raised sun terrace at the other end. "A few people think this area was at one time the bishop's kitchen garden but nobody really knows," remarks Nicolas.

The old limes that were on the site when the Winters arrived have since been carefully moved to a better spot and the garden planting amplified with roses and orange trees, hydrangea, lavender, bay and rosemary. Aptly enough, there is also a small vineyard, from which the Winters harvest the grapes to make a red wine de la maison each year. "Nothing special," says Nicolas, "just enough for us and our friends."

Inspired by the Winters, we look at stylish ways to shelter from the sun

Introducing a selection of shady spots in your garden has a wonderfully cooling effect. While eating is best suited to almost complete shade, relaxing and reading can be enjoyed in something more dappled. To create a structure similar to Nicolas and Corinne Winter's veranda (right), you will need to commission an architect – find a local company through the Royal Institute of British Architects, 020 7580 5533, architecture.com. For other ways to create shade, take a look at the ideas below.



SEASONAL FIXTURE

Perfect for outdoor parties, canvas canopies are a stylish way to protect from the sun. Cox & Cox, 0870 442 4787, coxandcox.co.uk, has a retro striped version, £250, while White Canvas, 0844 249 9007, whitecanvastents.com, hires out its Cupola model (right), from £2,550, which will accommodate ten diners.



USING LIVING PLANTS

Subtle shade can be

created with groupings of sun-tolerant trees in pots, including olive trees from Terrace Gardener, 01732 832762, terracegardener. co.uk, or tree ferns from Eden Project, 01736 336998, edenproject.com. Permanent structures, such as loggias and pergolas, can be combined with planting to create sheltered dining areas. These can be tailor-made by design companies, such as Plan to Garden, 01508 488490, plantogarden. co.uk (below), or bought ready-made from Garden Chic, 01636 858290, garden-chic.co.uk. ■



INSTANT SHADE

One of the quickest ways to create shelter is to hang a length of translucent fabric above or beside seating. Handembroidered sheers (above) from Malabar, 020 7501 4200, malabar.co.uk, make gorgeous impromptu sunshades, from £38.30m. However, this romantic look does need constant rearranging to intercept the rays. Decorative screens are also an effective way to soften direct sunlight. Parasols, such as the Indian canopy. £250, The White Company, 0845 678 8150, thewhite company.com, will add pizzazz to a picnic and are lightweight enough to reposition easily.

A gazebo is a decorative structure, made mostly of metal, over which roses or clematis can be trained. Fabric can also be draped across it to create shade. 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DESIGNER SECRETS

The Lafourcades' flair for simple château style open this room up to views of the Lubéron



DESIGNER PROFILE

BRUNO AND ALEXANDRE LAFOURCADE run an

interior design and architectural practice in St-Rémy-de-Provence which specialises in renovating châteaux and French country houses. They have also undertaken projects outside France and boast a discerning clientele. THE BRIEF To create a relaxing living room that links seamlessly with the terrace so the owners can make full use of both spaces all year round.

The English clients of this project bought what they originally termed a "shack", a tiny residence perched on a steep southfacing hillside in the village of Ménerbes in the Lubéron. They asked Bruno and Alexandre Lafourcade to use the site to build a modern home – but which would look 200 years old – and to transform the existing building into a guest annexe.

The space shown here, one of a series of bright, airy rooms, was designed for entertaining and relaxing, and links seamlessly with an ample terrace thanks to three pairs of bespoke metal and glass French windows. The terrace is shaded with a traditional awning of split bamboo mounted on an iron structure, through which dappled shade helps to keep the room cool in the fierce heat of summer. Off-white plaster walls and a pale grey polished-concrete floor also have a cool, calm effect, while serving as a good foil for the furniture – elegant French and Gustavian designs. By choosing these pieces in the same restricted palette of cream and muted grey, the Lafourcades have achieved a sophisticated scheme in natural harmony with the stunning views outside.

SMART GAZEBO

A romantic Indian-style tent makes a fabulous venue for outdoor dining. Using a circular table ensures a sociable feel, while cushions add extra comfort and are a good way to introduce pattern. Oversized pouffes in outdoor fabries are great for guests to use as informal seating both before and after dinner. As evening falls, a twinkling pendant light (wired back to the house) and flickering nightlights lend further atmosphere.





RUSTIC DINING ROOM

Plaster walls polished to a smooth, clean finish enhance existing architectural features, such as these impressive French windows. Simple decoration in the form of muted textiles and accessories, including earthy stoneware jugs and bowls for a countrystyle feel, play to the room's strength. A lavender centrepiece provides a fragrant finishing touch for the table while also linking inside and out.





RELAXED TERRACE

Simple good-quality tableware is key to this informal outdoor arrangement. Colour is added to the dining scheme with china and glassware in aqua and leaf-green tones, while a mix of textures including rustic chickenwire, natural wicker and chunky wood impart a contemporary French-country feel. As a final flourish, table decorations of potted herbs provide great effect for minimal effort.





HOW TO MAKE IT WORK







SMART GAZEBO

- Using sisal flooring and rugs in tents and gazebos makes it more comfortable underfoot for guests.
- A simple monochromatic palette can be enlivened with a twist of colour – use bright napkins and flowers to keep the look fresh.
- Inexpensive upholstered dining chairs with loose covers are a good choice for relaxing into the evening.
- Set up drinks tables shaded by parasols close to the gazebo. This will save journeys to and from the house and continue the Indian theme.

RUSTIC DINING ROOM

- During the summer, an empty fireplace can be decorated with flowers and favourite accessories.

- For extra detail, line curtains with a simple stripe or small dot pattern that contrasts with the main fabric.
- If you have washable curtain fabric left over, use it for matching cushions, place-mats and napkins.

RELAXED TERRACE



HOW DO YOU USE CHANDELIERS AS PART OF A SCHEME?



MV Much depends on the size and purpose of the room and the type of chandelier but, as a general rule, I like to use chandeliers that are oversized to provide an arresting decorative effect. Conversely, I don't like chandeliers to provide too strong a light. I prefer a soft glow, combined with other light sources in a room; I therefore use dimmers or very low-voltage bulbs.

AH A chandelier generally has the ceiling all to itself and therefore the perfect, uncluttered space in which to take centre stage. It can, of course, provide excitement and impact simply by being grand and impressive. I always prefer to see something original, sculptural and with a unique character that will add another layer of interest to the room's decoration.

LB I use chandeliers to give an interior a special atmosphere. During planning, I find placing chandeliers in key locations helps to structure the flow and carries a certain theme throughout the rest of the property. Chandeliers look their best in dining rooms (right) or entrances where they take centre stage. They generate interesting light that bounces off ceilings and walls, giving a warm, luxurious glow.

WHAT ARE THE PRACTICAL CONSIDERATIONS?

MV Owing to the weight of many large chandeliers, it is important to consider installation requirements early on in the design process. It may be necessary to access ceiling beams from the room above, or to use specialist fittings.

Also, chandeliers can be costly, so to avoid mistakes seek the professional advice of an interior designer about the right fixture for the room.

AH Sadly, a chandelier is not for every room and, with the best will in the world, you will not be able to create the sense of a ballroom in a low-beamed cottage. One solution is to lower a chandelier over a dining or hall table; the furniture will prevent anyone walking into it and the area will take on an intimate feel. If you are lucky enough to have three-metre-high ceilings, then almost anything is possible.

LB An interior designer or architect can help you get the proportions right. The most obvious measurement to have is that of your ceiling height and you need to think about ceiling supports, too. A chandelier's primary task is a decorative one, therefore other sources of task lighting should be available if necessary. Always use a trusted and qualified electrician to install your chandelier.



DO YOU HAVE ANY FAVOURITE DESIGNS AT THE MOMENT?

MV We manufacture an enormous range of chandeliers – more than 100 different models – in both traditional and contemporary styles in many different materials. My favourite at the moment is the Verbier CLA68/L (left), one of our modern crystal designs. I like the clean style of this chandelier and relish the contrast between the solid clear crystal balls and larger mottled circles.



AH I love the Porta Romana collection, of course, and my favourite piece is the Blossom chandelier (above). I wish I could take credit for it but it was designed by my partner, Sarah. It combines hand-forged metal branches gilded in our workshop and scrunched-up pieces of crystal. The crystals sparkle softly when lit and become the blossoms on the tree. Sublime.

LB I have always been very fond of using unusual and distinctive materials such as rock crystal, which brings an ethereal element to a room, or coloured glass beads. As part of our range of bespoke lighting, we have recently designed a chandelier with a set of asymmetrically arranged sections of chipped-edge glass; it hangs in the entrance of our flagship showroom in Brompton Cross.

CHOOSING BLINDS

From simple rollers to soft folds and smart slatted styles

SOFT OPTIONS

Fabric blinds are a versatile decorating element. Using far less material than curtains, they enable you to choose more luxurious fabrics.

ROLLER As flat panels that roll up out of sight, these are the best solution for flush windows. They can easily be layered with curtains and are ideal used alone in more functional spaces like bathrooms, kitchens and hallways - they are also simple to operate for children's rooms. If the top of the blind is going to be visible, opt for a reverse roller where the fabric sits in front of the mechanism. Ready-mades are available from high street stores such as John Lewis, B&Q and Marks & Spencer. Or you can take the bespoke route. Look out for specialist finishes such as blackout backing or patterned voiles to provide privacy. Hillarys have wipe-down Teflon-coated fabrics for kitchens and bathrooms, while Pret à Vivre will laminate any fabric of your choice on to standard or blackout backing and the company 55Max will reproduce your own photograph on a blind.

ROMAN A simple panel pulled up into concertina folds, this style of blind is unfussy yet elegant and works in both relaxed and formal room schemes. The folds are created by a series of cords, making the blind easy to operate, and it can sit inside or outside the architrave. These blinds are well suited to rooms with bountiful soft furnishings such as bedrooms, living and dining rooms.

ROLL-UP Also called Swedish blinds, these tailor-made options consist of two contrasting fabrics sewn back to back, which roll up from the bottom and are secured in place with ties at the top. Suited to kitchens, breakfast rooms or bedrooms, they have a clean simplicity and a relaxed, country-style charm. Slim in design, they also suit windows with narrow sills.

AUSTRIAN With full, feminine ruching, this decorative option takes on a smart look when made up in formal fabrics. The gathers are created by cords attached to a curtain-style heading tape to create soft folds across the vertical and the horizontal, thus creating a scalloped edge along the bottom.

PLEATED No longer seen as utilitarian, pleats are back in fashion. Crisp fabric folded into narrow pleats offers an ideal solution for awkwardly shaped or angled windows. The 3D effect is better at filtering strong light than flat panels, making pleated blinds a good choice for loft conversions and conservatories.



SLATTED BLINDS

Made from stiff gauze, wood, bamboo or aluminium, slatted blinds are designed to reduce glare without blocking out light. These blinds are some of the most responsive window treatments available.

VENETIAN These are made up of horizontal slats, varying from 15mm, 25mm, 35mm to 50mm wide, strung together by a series of cords. Attached to the underside of the window recess, they can simply be tilted, raised or lowered to control the light. Most commonly available in wood or aluminium, they are usually made to order, but there are affordable ready-made options too, and these can be trimmed for a precise fit. For moisture-prone rooms, such as kitchens and bathrooms, Aluwood from Hillarys has the style of wood but is made of resilient aluminium.

VERTICAL A series of upright slats held together with cords along the top and bottom, vertical blinds, like Venetians, can be angled, opened and closed as required. They're ideal for large windows such as those in conservatories or where access is required, as with French windows and patio doors.

SLIDING PANELS A more extreme form of the vertical blind, sliding panels operate in a similar way but with larger panels that run along tracks in the floor and ceiling. Silent Gliss offers an innovative panel glide system that can be installed on straight or curved windows, while House Couturier offers a good choice of fabrics, including patterned voiles, plains and blackout fabrics.







A PERFECT FIT

Accuracy is essential; use a metal ruler and measure to the nearest millimetre. Some companies offer a full measuring-up and fitting service. The person making your blind will carry out any necessary adjustments for the mechanism but be aware that roller blinds will be around 3cm narrower than your window.

FOR BLINDS OUTSIDE THE RECESS

- Work out how much you wish the fabric to overlap the wall a minimum of 45mm offers a substantial look.
- Measure the width of the window and add the total desired overlap.
- Measure the drop plus the overlap.
- There is a useful video on how to

measure up for blinds on the website, naturalcurtaincompany.co.uk.

FOR BLINDS INSIDE THE RECESS

- Check the recess is at least 75mm deep to allow for the mechanism.
- Measure the width at the top, middle and bottom and use the narrowest measurement. Repeat for the drop.





READY-MADE OR BESPOKE

Most of the large high street stores stock a decent choice of ready-made blinds in a range of sizes that can be trimmed to fit standard windows. You will find roller, Roman and Venetian as well as a few roll-up options in limited colourways, most often in neutrals and fashionable shades. Ready-made blinds offer an affordable and instant solution if you can find a style to suit but, for a sharp fit and a wealth of colours, patterns and styles, you cannot beat bespoke.

On the high street, Laura Ashley and John Lewis both offer a seven-day express service using stock fabrics and a choice of trimmings and mechanisms, while most interior designers and specialist companies take commissions, usually with a measuring-up and fitting service. The added benefit of using a designer is access to a wider range of fabrics. Specialist companies, such as Hillarys and Pret à Vivre, also offer a comprehensive range of fabrics and a nationwide service.

CONSERVATORIES

With metres of glass to cover, conservatory blinds are some of the most challenging window treatments. Performance is key to keeping this room comfortable all year round and, with blinds on both ceiling and wall windows, they need to be easy to operate and robust enough to keep their shape without sagging. A traditional choice is woodweave or Pinoleum, made of narrow closely bound strips of wood. However, these offer little in the way of insulation. Roller, Roman, pleated and Venetian blinds can all be adapted successfully. Pleated fit neatly in each window rebate and, when fully retracted, virtually disappear. Roller blinds can be backed with aluminium to reflect up to 85 per cent of the sun's heat in summer and retain up to 18 per cent more heat in winter. Venetian blinds can be made super slim to fit neatly inside each window rebate and reduce the height of the stack when fully retracted. Try Thomas Sanderson and Appeal Blinds for specialist solutions.

SHUTTER OPTIONS

Finding the best solution to ensure enduring appeal

Fitting shutters is a good way to provide privacy and to control light. Prices vary greatly depending on the quality and service and, with three key styles available in a vast choice of wood and painted finishes, the designs are less fussy than fabric options and more durable. They are also suitable for use in the bathroom and kitchen. "Shutters are practical, low maintenance and very hardwearing. Having a longer lifespan than blinds or curtains, they make an excellent investment choice," says Sarah Quilliam of Hillarys.

STYLES AVAILABLE

Louvred shutters give best the light control, while solid shutters, such as those from Sashes and Shutters, are historically accurate for Georgian properties. Some manufacturers, including The California Company, offer shutters that have solid panels at the lower half with slatted tops. Or you might opt for a more decorative Gustavian or French design. The plantation shutter has louvres that can be 47mm, 64mm, 89mm or up to 114mm wide.

Kelly's Shutters, available in eggshell, gloss or stain finisb, from £99sq.m, Kelly Hoppen at B&Q.

Tier-on-tier bespoke shutters, from £375sq m.

MATERIALS AND FINISHES

Cedar, yellow poplar and elm are three timbers used for internal shutters, as the wood grows straight, has a smooth grain and is lightweight. Some have an engineered core finished with veneer to combat warping. Cedar is the best choice for bathrooms and kitchens as it is naturally water-resistant, although waterproof polyvinyl is available too. Wooden shutters can be stained or oiled. Most companies offer a palette of wood tones and neutrals, while others offer a bespoke colour service.

SHUTTER FORMATION

You can control light levels through your choice of configuration. Full-height shutters are a good solution for bedrooms, as little light seeps in when closed. Tier-on-tier shutters are split into two rows (usually of equal height) allowing you to open and close the top and bottom halves independently. Café-style shutters cover just the bottom half of the window, letting light in at the top; this is a popular format for kitchens and bathrooms.

MEASURING UP AND ORDERING

The majority of shutters will be made to order with a measuring-up, fitting and adjusting service all included in the price. The nature of the housing stock in the UK results in fairly irregular windows, and most shutters are set on a battening system for easy adjustment. Decide whether you want your shutters to sit within the window recess or to fold flat against the wall – the representative for your shutter company should be able to go through all the options with you.

WORKING WITH AWKWARD WINDOWS

Slimline and fuss-free, blinds and shutters are particularly useful for providing successful window treatments where curtains would not be suitable.

- BAY WINDOWS Even when open curtains can reduce light in a bay, while roller blinds will have gaps at the edges when pulled down. Fitted shutters don't have these problems. Thomas Sanderson has developed the BayPole shutter system for bay windows in 60 colours plus a colour matching service.
- SKYLIGHTS & LANTERNS Light and glare can be controlled with integral roller, Venetian or pleated blinds, which are fitted inside the double glazing unit or as separate panels that sit neatly on top. Flying pleated blinds from Velux are fixed to side channels so can be positioned as required.

■ FRENCH WINDOWS & PATIO DOORS

These need to remain uncluttered to provide access and not hamper the view. Opt for a series of retractable full-height panel blinds. Fitted to a track either inside or above the window recess, the panels can slide across or retract back as needed.

■ ROUND & FAN-SHAPED WINDOWS
Even though both types can look great
in a bathroom or on a stairwell, they
are actually rather difficult to dress.
A bespoke shaped shutter is the most
effective solution and will enhance the
window's outline and character. Expect
to pay around £250sq m.

BRANCHING OUT



For the guest bathroom in his Lincolnshire home, Mark Ander's brief to Neil Partridge and Darren Cherry of NGI Design was, simply,

"Do something I wouldn't expect." Having admired Bisazza's Corallo range by Marco Braga for some time, Neil realised this was the perfect opportunity to use it. "It's simple but glamorous with bits of white gold that sparkle. Also it is quite timeless so it doesn't overpower the small space," Neil adds.

The original coral mural was redesigned at Bisazza's Italian headquarters to ensure a symmetrical fit with the sloping ceiling. The tile company tweaked the height and width of each coral branch, interspersing bubbles of white gold tesserae (individual mosaic tiles) through the fronds. Once the design was approved, a team of Italian tilers was flown to the UK to install it. "The tiles come in 30cm sq sheets, but they're paper faced so you can't see what you're putting on the wall. For this reason it's a highly skilled job, so it was well worth flying specialists over," says Neil.

Crisp white and sleek chrome finishes for the rest of the bathroom fittings keep the spotlight firmly on the mosaic pattern. "With bold tiles like these, it pays to use them sparingly and to keep everything else simple," says Neil. "Mark absolutely loves the space. He is very focused on detail so appreciates the craftsmanship that has gone into this feature wall."

SMALL SCALE



Maia and Tom Hale admit the guest bathroom in their Notting Hill home is tiny, but they felt it called for big personality. Inspired by Emery et


Cie's Paris showroom, they chose Rosiers and Oeillets concrete floor tiles from the In A Garden range, and Chacours zelliges (fish-scale-shaped terracotta tiles) for the walls. "Each wall tile is hand cut so no two are the same," says Milla Gough-Willetts of Studio Azzurro, "and the graduated shades lend a beautiful cloudy effect." While the tiles are stunning, laying them proved a challenge and Studio Azzurro went through two tilers before

they finally found someone with the required patience and skill. "Having different depths, the tiles can be hard to interlock, and to ensure a random blend of colours you need to lay the tiles out like a puzzle on the floor," says Milla. She also suggested pushing the original flat ceiling up to the rafters to give the tiles breathing space. DK Joinery created a cantilevered vanity unit in teak veneer, punctuated by Pierre-Yves Rochon porcelain basin taps in a silver damask pattern that complement the floor tiles, while a bespoke teak tray was made for the shower. "It took time, especially the tiles," says Milla, "but the end result was worth it."

MAKING IT WORK

- If using decorated tiles, create a tiling plan to ensure the pattern is central and meets seamlessly at corners.

 Some designers have a CAD service that provides a computerised image of the tiled space in advance.
- Good tiles demand decent fitting. Find a reputable fixer through The Tile Association's directory at tiles.org.uk.
- When fixing tiles in wet areas it is essential to tile on to a water-resistant background.
 Sand/cement render, dense concrete or tile backer board are all ideal materials for this.
 Also pay attention to sealing the gaps between tiles and shower trays or bath tubs, using a good-quality anti-fungicide silicon sealant.

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DREAM KITCHEN

Rob Morrison used classic cabinetry with a soft colour scheme to create an airy feel in his clients' coastal home

CAN YOU DESCRIBE THE ORIGINAL SPACE?

The first kitchen was small, gloomy and opposite farm buildings, so owners Joanna and Steve Brooks added a double-height extension to maximise the natural light and also changed the room's aspect.

WHAT WAS THE BRIEF?

The couple wanted a simple, classic, handmade kitchen that would blend naturally with the flow of the house. Steve is an explorer and extremely driven. His perfectionism pushed the project to new heights as he was determined to see how things could be improved.

HOW DID YOU PLAN THE ROOM'S LAYOUT?

There was a brick column where the island now stands. We tried to design around it but, in the end, the couple

chose to install steel joists that criss-cross the ceiling without the need of a central support. This opened up the space and allowed me to create a more free-flowing layout.

WHAT MATERIALS DID YOU CHOOSE?

The cupboards are based on our Williamsburg range, which features Shaker-style details such as pillow-front drawers, chunky stiles and boarded end panels. Painting the cabinets and walls in the same soft shade created a sense of cohesion throughout the space. Using another pale colour on the floor meant that we were able to choose darker worktops. Honed black granite provides a tough surface next to the Aga, but elsewhere aged iroko was chosen for its lovely warm finish; it will eventually darken to a rich chestnut colour.

WHAT ABOUT THE APPLIANCES?

We added an electric oven and induction hob for backup during the summer when the Aga is switched off. To avoid the fridge-freezer dominating the space, we had it recessed into an alcove between the steel joists. There is a smaller retro-style model near the main sink, which is used for drinks.

ARE THERE ANY ADDITIONAL FEATURES?

There is an amazing walk-in pantry just to the left of the stairs, which has a door that came from a boat's cold room store and a huge, clunky lock. As the room takes the storage pressure off the kitchen, I didn't need to include wall units. A chalkboard on a hinged door next to the couple's fridge-freezer is handy for shopping lists and messages, and also

hides the electrical supplies, as well as access for maintenance.

TELL US ABOUT THE LIGHTING CHOICES

The reclaimed pendants over the dining table were originally factory lights. They really are rather big and look fantastic. The kitchen gets limited natural light, but pale materials and a minimal use of wall cabinets mean that light is carried through from the windows in the dining area.

WHAT IS THE KEY TO THIS KITCHEN'S SUCCESS?

The trust the clients showed allowed me to go beyond the expected. Elements such as the white-washed floorboards, high portholes and antique dining chairs covered in French hessian grain sacks have created a chic coastal feel that does not go over the top.

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
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












no more than two or three acres, La Ballue suggests seductive intimacy rather than overwhelming grandeur.

For the original designers there was never any question of restoring or recreating a 17th-century garden. The plot was divided into two parts. Directly in front of the château, a garden of classical formality is charged with terrific vitality by a yew hedge which undulates along the southern perimeter like a rippling ribbon. To the south-east of the château, numerous green chambers were planted along two diagonally intersecting axes. Each of these is themed: first, a small fern garden anchors La Ballue firmly in its landscape (this part of Brittany is known as Le Pays de Fougères, or fern country); next, yew spirals and obelisks rise through a frothing sea of alchemilla in Le jardin mouvementé; beyond, cathedral-like arches of leylandii cypresses lead to a circular "theatre" and "temple" of clipped thujas dedicated to Diana.

Contemporary sculpture inhabits every part of the garden: here, a contemplative face rises serenely above water lilies in the scented grove; there, pale hands and feet reach for the sky. There is much to entice and amuse, not least the sudden glorious openings onto the wide landscape and the dual perspectives of two allées: one leading into the light, the other into the shade.

"La Ballue is so much more than the sum of its parts," says Marie-Françoise. "It is the wonderful interaction between the château, its garden and the landscape that makes it sublime."







DESIGNER SECRETS

Tim Rees reveals the inspiration behind this Provençal garden's deceptively simple scheme



DESIGNER PROFILE

TIM REES graduated from the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew in 1982

and formed a design partnership with Brita von Schoenaich in the 1990s. Together they developed their own naturalistic style of planting design. In 2003, Tim started his own practice, Trees Associates. He has received international acclaim for his modern country gardens and restoration work, as well as for his bolder, more contemporary urban designs. In addition to designing landscapes and gardens across the UK, he has worked in France, Corfu, Italy and America. **THE BRIEF** The clients wanted their garden at the foot of the Alpilles in Provence to be divided into themed rooms. The olive garden (shown) was created close to the house as a shield against the mistral.

"When I first visited the garden, it had just a partial allée of plane trees, a few cypresses and the remnants of plastic greenhouses set around an old farmhouse. The rest of the plot was made up of open fields with no wind protection from the damaging mistral, so my first job was to provide a shelter-belt. We enclosed the main part of the garden with a wall and in one area created this olive garden.

"Provençal gardens demand a structural palette and I was inspired by Nicole de Vésian's use of clipped, rounded shrubs and topiary in her iconic garden. The design works well here, creating a thoroughly relaxing landscape; to my mind, perennials send a subliminal message of staking and hard work. I used two types of santolina punctuated by eight olive trees that form a square pattern – you can see just two of them here. The only other colours are the red of the dwarf pomegranate – a highlight among the silvery cerastium and a useful spreading plant that knits the other shrubs together beautifully – and a few spires of lavender."

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

Focal points that add design interest and soothe the senses



BUBBLY DISPLAY

Breathe life into a still summer's day with a gently murmuring bubble fountain in a terracotta urn. Set it near a seating area so you can enjoy it while you relax.






To reproduce this striking effect, produced by one of the 50 fountains, cascades and jets at Les Jardins d'Annevoie in Belgium, you will need a semi-circular fountainhead that sprays water in the shape of a fan.









Billowing borders of herbaceous planting create the perfect setting for a classic fountain. Period designs are available from reclamation specialists, or consider buying a replica in reconstituted stone.

FRENCH ELEGANCE

Take inspiration from landscape architect Michel Semini's understated design in which lush conifers and a raised pool animated by a single water jet combine to cool the atmosphere.







ON A SMALL SCALE


In a contemporary setting you could try a solitary stainless-steel feature such as this design by Allison Armour. Place it where the water catches the sun, illuminating the garden with spangles of light.





THE MAGIC OF THE ALHAMBRA

Recreate Moorish style with canals and water jets like those in the gardens of the Palacio de Generalife in Granada, Spain. Certain elements would work just as well in an urban space.

WHAT SORT OF FOUNTAIN WORKS BEST WHERE?



FD "In a small contemporary courtyard, try a mirror-polished sculpture, while for a terrace, I would recommend a central feature such as our stainless-steel water chalice – a bowl underlit for a beautiful night-time effect. A sculptural fountain would also work well. For one client we made a large fountain from glass, which helped to mask the noise of a motorway and made a dramatic focal point."


IS "We rarely use large fountains - on occasion a water jet is all that is needed to animate a space. We tend to go for understated designs, perhaps using a jet in a pond to break the surface with ripples. One design we created for a small city garden was a simple cube of basalt with water spilling over the top (far right). This is both child- and pet-friendly because the reservoir is covered."

AP "Your choice of fountain depends on how much space you have and the level of noise you want. Remember, too, that you'll need a reservoir that is the same diameter as the water height; so a feature that shoots water two metres into the air needs a reservoir two metres in diameter. If you want the vertical impact of a tall feature in a small garden, opt for a water wall (above) rather than a fountain."

ARE FOUNTAINS "GREEN" AND CAN I USE THEM IN A DROUGHT?

FD "You can use some features under a hosepipe ban but others may not be allowed, depending on how much water evaporates and how often they need to be topped up. We have installed features with reservoirs linked to underground drainwater tanks, so these don't use tap water. We also use extract of barley straw rather than chemicals to keep the water clear. You can buy this online."

IS "You need an electricity supply for most fountains and features - solar power is often not an option - and the amount of power used depends on the pump size. Water that just spills from a bubbling feature like our cube needs a small pump and is therefore more eco-friendly than a tall fountain, while the reservoir circulates the water. You lose some water through evaporation but not a significant amount."



AP "A fountain in a large natural pool should be fine under a drought order, but fountains falling on to paved surfaces evaporate a lot so may be restricted. The energy needed depends on the height—the higher the water is pushed up, the more power it needs. A solar-powered pump may be an option for a small water wall. Also, try eco-friendly ozone rather than bromine to keep the water clear."

HOW DO YOU MIX GARDEN STYLES AND FOUNTAIN DESIGNS?



FD "You could mix traditional and modern designs if your garden is large enough. A stone feature would work well close to a period house, while a more contemporary sculptural piece (left) could be used at the end of a route that takes the eye away from the property. I always choose the materials carefully. Stainless steel is best for modern schemes, while copper and basalt work well in traditional settings."

IS "There are no hard and fast rules about what fountain designs look best where but you do need to pay attention to the setting. Generally, a period fountain in a modern setting doesn't look ideal and, likewise, we would never use a stainless-steel feature in a traditional landscape. A simple spray, without a sculptural head, which creates pulses of water or ripples over a surface, will suit most designs."

AP "A modern feature can work well with an old building if it creates a stark contrast, but it depends on many factors, and we always consider the setting and the clients' wishes. The material you use, rather than the design, is important. A modern water wall in natural stone will look good in a traditional garden. I would never use mock period fountains – they always look fake, whatever the setting."





Recommended varieties

ONIONS

'Red Baron' AGM The best rounded, red onion with wine-red glossy skin and a strong flavour.

'Sturon' AGM The best-selling onion, producing medium-sized straw-coloured bulbs. Stores well.

'Setton' AGM Light golden skin, a rounded shape and an excellent flavour; this one also stores well.

'Jet Set' AGM A hybrid onion that matures early and crops heavily.

'Hi-keeper' A very hardy Japanese onion grown from seeds sown in August and harvested early summer.

'White Lisbon' The classic spring "bunching" onion with white bulbs.

'Santero' A new F1 onion with a coppery skin. Available exclusively from Thompson & Morgan in 2011.

GARLI

'Early Purple Wight' AGM Originally from Cadours in southwest France, this is the earliest hardneck variety.

'Iberian Wight' This variety produces 12cm bulbs that store until January.

'Tuscany Wight' This softneck variety is widely grown in Tuscany, where its cloves are used in local dishes.

'Elephant Garlic' More closely related to the leek than garlic, but its 15cm-wide cloves are often roasted. 'Black Garlic' This has been aged to reach a sweet flavour. It has twice as

many antioxidants as white garlic.

SHALLOTS

'Golden Gourmet' AGM Large golden shallot with deep flavour, 'Pikant' High-yielding, red-skinned shallot bred in Holland. Keeps well. 'Devald' AGM A pink-tinged shallot that produces eight to ten bulbs. 'Jermor' AGM Also pink-tinged and with an excellent flavour. 'Longor' A 'Jersey Long' variety,

with a robust flavour.

Storing

- Dry the bulbs thoroughly before storing, preferably in the fresh air, and always handle them carefully.
- Keep garlic in a dark, cool, airy place.
- Shallots can be kept in a wicker basket and onions are traditionally strung up with string; a dry shed is ideal.
- Rounder onions and shallots store better than longer, narrower ones.

Ready-made shortcrust, puff and filo

What to look for when buying and using

shortcrust You can use standard shortcrust for most sweet tarts. Buy in a block or ready rolled and look for all-butter recipes. There are also sweet shortcrust pastries available.

PUFF Making puff pastry at home can be labour intensive

and shop-bought versions give perfectly good results. Buy in a block or pre-rolled.

FILO Available to buy fresh and frozen, these thin sheets are easy to use. Cover the unused sheets with a damp tea towel while working, to avoid them drying out.

How to make sweet and choux pastry

These types of pastry are usually best made at home and are easier than you might think

SWEET SHORTCRUST PASTRY (PÂTE SUCRÉE)

This rich, short pastry has a biscuity texture. It crumbles easily but is very malleable so just push it back together.

150g salted butter, diced, at room temperature 75g vanilla sugar 250g plain white flour 1/4 tsp salt 1 medium egg, beaten with 1 tbsp iced water

Use a hand-held electric beater to whisk the butter until creamy. Whisk in the vanilla sugar until the mixture is pale and light, then sift in the flour and salt. Stir using a fork to combine, then mix in the egg-water to form a ball of sweet pastry. Wrap in clingfilm and then chill for at least 20 minutes to rest.


To make this pastry in a food processor, which is very easy to do, blitz the butter until creamy, add the vanilla sugar and blitz briefly again. Add the flour and salt, and blitz in 2-second bursts until evenly mixed. Finally, drizzle in the egg and water with the machine still running until the pastry clumps and forms a ball. Wrap and chill as before.

CHOUX PASTRY

The name of this pastry means "cabbage" because of its fluffy appearance. This is created by steam when the pastry is baking, during which the water in the recipe turns to vapour and the egg protein sets firm in a billowing shape. The cooked pastry is hollow, perfect for holding cream or other fillings. As choux isn't sweet, it can take chocolate, coffee, caramel or flower-scented icing glazes beautifully.

175g butter, diced 1/2 tsp salt and 225g plain white flour, sifted together 6 medium eggs

In a medium-sized saucepan bring 225ml water and the butter to the boil. Tip in the sifted salt and flour, then beat hard with a hand-held electric whisk until the mix forms a ball that leaves the side of the pan. Take off the heat and add the eggs, one at a time, beating hard with the electric whisk to form a rich, glossy paste.



Light but crunchy, filo makes a delicious case for fruit. A butter-honey glaze adds flavour and shine

MAKES 4

5 ripe figs, halved lengthways
4 tbsp flower-scented honey
2 tbsp elderflower cordial
12 green cardamom pods,
crushed open
50g salted butter, melted
5 sheets filo pastry (about
140g) unrolled, covered
2-4 tbsp rosé or red wine
4 tsp icing sugar, optional

Set the halved figs, cut sides down, in a non-stick frying pan with 2 tablespoons of honey, the cordial and 2 tablespoons of water. Add the black seeds from four of the cardamom pods. Cook over a high heat for 1-2 minutes or until the figs are aromatic, slightly wilted and sizzling. Turn the figs over and leave to cool in their scented, sticky, honeyed juices. Spoon off 2 tablespoons and stir into the melted butter to make the pastry glaze. Pre-heat the oven to 180°C. Gas Mark 4. Have ready a muffin tin, if possible lined with 4 silicon (non-stick) muffin moulds. Cut the filo sheets in half lengthways and then in half widthways, giving a total

depending on the original shape of the sheets. Push 2 rectangles at a time, their points offset, into 4 muffin tin hollows. Repeat this until each hollow has 4 layers of pastry, firmly pressed into position; add a fifth and final layer, again offset. Bake these unbuttered baskets for 8 minutes towards the top of the oven. Remove the baskets. Gently paint the scented honey and melted butter glaze mixture over them, then bake for 5 minutes more. Turn off the oven but leave the pastries in. Remove the figs from the glaze. Halve each to give long segments and set 5, pointing upwards, into each warm pastry basket. Set each on a serving plate. Reheat the remaining honey with the glaze for 2 minutes with enough wine to make a pink syrupy sauce. Drizzle some over the figs and the remainder around each basket (not shown). Add 2 open cardamom pods to each dessert, then dust with sieved icing sugar, if liked. Serve warm, or cool within 4 hours.

Cinnamon-Cherry Towers

This dessert is made with sweet shortcrust pastry (pâte sucrée) and coated with a vanilla-cinnamon glaze

1 sweet shortcrust pastry recipe (see opposite page)
2 tsp vanilla extract
2 tsp ground cinnamon
2 tbsp clear honey, warmed
For the filling
100g pitted cherries, cooked
and puréed
300g mascarpone or
cream cheese
50g sieved icing sugar

1 tbsp dark rum 200ml double cream, whipped 6 fresh cherries, stems left on

Make the sweet shortcrust pastry and leave to rest. Mix together the vanilla, cinnamon and honey with I tablespoon of boiling water to make a spiced glaze. Set aside.

Whisk together half the cherry purée and all the mascarpone,

sugar and rum to create a mousse-like mix. Fold this into the cream. Swirl the remaining purée into this to marble it. Chill. Pre-heat the oven to 200°C, Gas Mark 6. Roll out the pastry to 3mm thickness on a floured piece of baking parchment, measuring about twice the size of your baking sheet. Cut 18 circles with an 8cm pastry cutter, spacing each about 2cm

apart. Remove the excess pastry. Cut the paper in half and slide each onto a baking sheet. Prick the pastries a few times with a fork. Bake for 25-30 minutes. Brush some cinnamon-glaze liquid on to each hot pastry, then leave to cool on wire racks. To serve, layer the pastry discs with the cherry mousse, as shown, and put a fresh cherry on top. Serve within the hour.



375g puff pastry, chilled fresh apricots or 411g can apricots in syrup, drained 4 tbsp apricot jam 2 tbsp apricot or peach schnapps or liqueur 25g icing sugar, sifted

Pre-heat the oven to 220°C, Gas Mark 7. Roll out the pastry on a floured surface to a thickness of 3mm. Cut out circles using a plain 15cm cutter, then roll each gently in one direction to create 18cm ovals. To make the filling, halve and pit the apricots. Smash 8 of the pits with a meat hammer. Retrieve the white kernels and chop these finely. Cut each apricot half into four. (If using

canned apricots, chop and crush 6 hazelnuts or almonds and sprinkle with 1 teaspoonful of almond extract). Stir the jam and liqueur together to make a glaze. Set 4 pieces of apricot on one half of each pastry oval, drizzle with some glaze-mix and scatter with chopped kernels. Brush the pastry edges with water, fold the lid over the fluit and press closed. Scallop the pastry edges, Continue

until all the pastry, kernels and fruit are used up. Slide the pastries onto a lightly oiled oven sheet and brush with the remaining glaze. Use a sharp knife to cut 3 or 5 decorative curved slashes on the top of each turnover. Bake towards the centre of the oven for 22-25 minutes or until the pastries are dark, puffed and aromatic. Serve hot, warm or cool, dusted with icing sugar.









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Paris-Brest Fleurie (CHOUX PASTRY DESSERT WITH FLOWERS)

This work of art receives an unusual twist with hints of rose, orange and jasmine. Decorate with edible petals

SERVES 8-12 Choux pastry (see page 152) For the glaze 50g icing sugar, sieved 1-2 tbsp squeezed orange juice 2 tsp each of orange flower water and rose water 2 tsp cassis or sloe gin For the filling 300ml double cream, chilled 75g icing sugar, sifted 15g each of clean, scented pink and red fresh rose petals and clean scented fresh jasmine flowers, all de-stalked 3 scented pink roses and a handful of jasmine flowers, all on the stem, to decorate

Make the pastry and, when the eggs are added and the paste is firm, shiny and dense, spoon it into a piping bag with a plain, 1cm nozzle. Cut 2 x 12.5cm circles of baking parchment and set each on a wetted baking sheet. Turn the circles over, so the wet sides are up. Pipe a circle of 12-14 paste rosettes on each, following the shape of the

paper. Pipe the remaining choux into single rosettes on the baking sheets, 3cm apart. Bake the first choux ring and puffs for 30-40 minutes or until golden (they should sound hollow when the base is tapped). Repeat for the second ring. Turn off the oven, returning all the pastry to it to dry for 30 minutes, then cool on a wire rack. For the glaze, mix all the ingredients. Dip the single puffs into the glaze, letting it trickle down slightly. Attach the iced puffs to the top of one choux ring with half a teaspoon of glaze. Trickle extra glaze between each puff. For the filling, whisk the double cream until soft. Add the icing sugar and whisk again until fairly firm, then fold in the rest of the glaze. Use this mix, adding some petals, to cover the upturned (flat) side of the second ring. Set the first iced ring on top and decorate with roses and sprigs of jasmine pushed into the centre of the ring. Serve within two hours. >

Feuilletée aux Fruits (BERRY SLICE)

This dessert bursts with fresh berries and couldn't be easier thanks to the puff pastry (pâte feuilletée)

SERVES 4-6 350g pre-rolled puff pastry 125g redcurrant or pomegranate jelly 90ml squeezed lime juice 200g each of redcurrants, de-stemmed; raspberries; strawberries, hulled and halved lengthways; blackberries, hulled; and blueberries 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon

Pre-heat the oven to 220°C. Gas Mark 7. Roll out the pastry and trim to 32x18cm. Using a pizza cutter or very sharp knife, mark a frame 2cm in from the edges, cutting part-way through the pastry. Prick the inner rectangle

all over. Bake for 20-25 minutes towards the centre of the oven until the edges are deep gold, raised and puffed, and the centre is pale and slightly risen. Leave to cool, pressing the centre to flatten it. Melt the jelly with the lime juice in a small pan over a high heat, crushing and stirring to a thin syrupy glaze. Brush a little over the pastry case base to seal it. Arrange the fruit in rows, then sprinkle with cinnamon through a sieve. Using a soft pastry brush, paint some of the cooled syrupy glaze all over, then bake for 5 minutes only. Remove from the oven and brush on more glaze. Serve while still warm, or when cool.



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
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
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
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
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
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






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
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
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
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


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






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
















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
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













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




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


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
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
